

City of Memphis Mayor

Job Description: Our city's mayor-council form of government provides that all administrative duties concerning day-to-day operations of city government are the duty and responsibility of the mayor. Each of the various divisions of city government has a director who is appointed by the mayor with the City Council's approval. The directors are responsible to the mayor to prepare a budget request for the council's consideration and approval. It is also the duty of the mayor to carry out the policy, laws and regulations of the city as established by the council and provided for in the City Charter and Code of Ordinances. All recommendations of the mayor in the areas of law and policy must also be submitted to the City Council for approval.

City Council

Job Description: The charter provides that it is the duty and responsibility of the City Council to consider the mayor's budget request and to take final action on it which may consist of approval, rejection, or approval with amendments. Additionally, the charter gives the council the responsibility for setting the tax rate and establishing other lawful taxes and fees necessary to secure sufficient revenue to fund the budget as approved. Under the provisions of the City charter the council makes the laws that govern the city. The council also serves as an appeal board for decisions of certain city government departments and boards; for example, decisions of the Land Use Control Board are appealed to the City Council, as are decisions of the Alcohol Commission.

City School Board

Job Description: The Board of Education is responsible for establishing goals for the school system and adopting policies for the effective operation of the school system. The Board appoints a Superintendent to oversee the operation of the school system in accordance with the educational goals and policies it establishes. Memphis City Schools is the largest school system in the State of Tennessee and the 21st largest school system in the nation and serves more than 119,000 students among 191 schools in grades K-12.

Approval of the budget (approximately \$775 million) is a major function of the Board. Commissioners support the hiring of teachers, administrators, and support staff who are responsible for educating the students.

Minimum qualifications: Each member shall be a resident of the City of Memphis and of the district from which he or she is elected. No person shall be elected, or appointed as hereinafter provided, as a member of the board of education of the Memphis city schools unless he or she shall have been a resident voter and taxpayer of the City of Memphis for not less than five (5) years preceding his or her election or appointment, or unless he or she shall have resided during the five (5) years preceding his or her election or appointment in territory that has been annexed to, and at the time of such election or appointment forms a part of, the City of Memphis, but it shall not be necessary for the territory in which such person resides to be annexed for five (5) years; nor shall any person be elected or appointed as a member of the said board of education from a particular district unless he or she has been a resident of such district for not less than six (6) months preceding the date of his or her election. A second "home" or apartment in a district, where true domicile is not established, shall not be sufficient for residency under this section.

County Mayor

Job Description: The County Mayor is responsible for all administrative duties concerning day-to-day operations of County government. It is also the duty of the mayor to carry out the policy, laws and regulations of the County as established by the Commission and provided for in the County Charter. The county mayor shall present a consolidated budget of the county to the board of county commissioners in April in order for the board of county commissioners either to approve said budget as presented or to modify and amend the same as may be deemed requisite in order to determine the amount of taxes necessary to be levied. The Mayor nominates members of all boards, authorities and commissions, and their appointments are subject to approval by resolution of the board of county commissioners.

Commissioners Bailey, Kirk and Commissioner Julian Bolton filed suit against the county in 2004 in an attempt to overturn the law. Shelby County Board of Commissioners

Job Description: The legislative power of Shelby County is vested in the board of County Commissioners. The legislative power includes all lawful authority to adopt ordinances and resolutions governing the operation of government or regulating the conduct and affairs of the residents of the county, to adopt the county budget, to fix the county tax rate, to make appropriations of county funds for all legal purposes, and to exercise all other authority of a legislative nature which is vested in the county by the Constitution, general statutes, or special, local or private acts of the General Assembly or this charter. The legislative branch may adopt any ordinance or resolution which is not in conflict with the Constitution or general laws of the State of Tennessee.

County Sheriff

Job Description: The Sheriff, as set forth by the Tennessee State Constitution, is the highest ranking law enforcement officer in the county. The Sheriff's Office works in partnership with all law enforcement agencies throughout the 775 square miles of Shelby County. Although various cities within the county have their own police forces, Sheriff's Deputies are a vital resource for each of these agencies. Deputies serve arrest warrants, patrol the streets and share responsibilities with these police agencies through "Metro Units." Other law enforcement duties fulfilled by the Sheriff's Office include serving court documents and providing courtroom security in the General Sessions, Criminal, Chancery, Circuit and Probate courts, and capturing fugitives. The Sheriff's Office also oversees the Shelby County Jail. There are two facilities, one for men and the other for women.

Have been certified by a qualified professional in the psychiatric or psychological fields to be free of all apparent mental disorder. Possess a current and valid POST certification issued within 12 months of the qualifying deadline for the office.

Job Description: The Criminal Court Clerk is the keeper of the records for the Criminal Court of Shelby County, which holds a staff of over 100 employees. There are ten different divisions within the Criminal Court - each handling cases involving robbery, murder, assault, embezzlement and other criminal acts. No other county in Tennessee handles more cases each year, averaging about 13,000 indictments involving 17,000 defendants.

US President

Job Description: The Constitution assigns the president two roles: chief executive of the federal government and Commander in Chief of the armed forces. As Commander in Chief, the president has the authority to send troops into combat, and is the only one who can decide whether to use nuclear weapons.

As chief executive, he enforces laws, treaties, and court rulings; develops federal policies; prepares the national budget; and appoints federal officials. He also approves or vetoes acts of Congress and grants pardons.

The President is the administrative head of the executive branch of the Government, which includes numerous agencies, both temporary and permanent, as well as 15 executive level cabinet departments.

US Senate

Job Description: The primary duty of the United States Senate is to write, debate, and pass bills (proposed laws), which are then passed on to the president for approval. Other congressional duties include investigating pressing national issues, supervising the executive and judicial branches, and shaping U.S. foreign policy.

The President submits a budget to the Senate by the first Monday in February every year. The budget contains estimates of federal government income and spending for the upcoming fiscal year and also recommends funding levels for the federal government. The Senate then must pass appropriations bills based on the President's recommendations and Congressional priorities.

The Constitution provides that the President can make certain appointments only with the "advice and consent" of the Senate. Officials whose appointments require the Senate's approval include members of the Cabinet, heads of federal executive agencies, ambassadors, Justices of the Supreme Court, and other federal judges.

The Senate is organized into 16 permanent committees, which in turn have nearly 70 subcommittees. These committees and subcommittees hold hearings, conduct research, and supervise the executive branch. Key committees include the appropriations, budget, and finance committees, and those specializing in agriculture, armed services, banking, commerce, and foreign affairs. The committees and subcommittees make many of the Senate's most important legislative decisions. The average senator sits on three to four committees and about six subcommittees, so most senators work on a wide range of issues. In addition to their committee work, senators often try to affect legislation being considered by committees on which they do not serve.

US Congress

Job Description: The primary duty of Congress is to write, debate, and pass bills (proposed laws), which are then passed on to the president for approval. Other congressional duties include investigating pressing national issues, supervising the executive and judicial branches, and shaping U.S. foreign policy.

The President submits a budget to Congress by the first Monday in February every year. The budget contains estimates of federal government income and spending for the upcoming fiscal year and also recommends funding levels for the federal government. Congress then must pass appropriations bills based on the President's recommendations and Congressional priorities.

The House enjoys the sole authority to propose tax legislation, but the Senate must approve tax bills as they would any other type of legislation. By tradition, all bills funding government activities also originate in the House. The House also has the power to initiate impeachment proceedings against the president and other federal officials, but the Senate conducts the actual impeachment trials.

The House has 19 committees. Most of these committees in turn have subcommittees to consider narrower topics. On average House members work on two committees and three subcommittees. Because of the House's large size, its committees usually frame issues for debate in the chamber. In contrast, major issues are sometimes shaped by the Senate as a whole. The House as a body usually defers to decisions made by individual committees, making House committees even more powerful than those in the Senate.
